GO FISHING WITH YOUR LIBRARY CARD



Trout season opened March 1st! Salem Public Library and the Missouri Department of Conservation are partners in the Rod and Reel Loaner Program. Through the Rod & Reel Loaner Program individuals can check out fishing poles and tackle boxes for free using their library cards at the Salem Public Library. The fishing poles are equipped with standard spin-cast reels. The tackle boxes are supplied with hooks, sinkers, rubber worms, and bobbers for basic fishing opportunities. Individuals need to provide their own live bait or

desired lures to bait the hook. Equipment checks out for 3 days. Fishing rods and tackle boxes need to be

returned to the circulation desk, not the drop box. Items may not be renewed and are subject to overdue fines.

This program is appropriate for all ages


ACTIVITIES

LIBRARY CARDS

Many Patrons will agree that their library card is one of the most important in their wallet. Getting a card is easy. Simply present a photo I.D. and proof of address. People living within the Salem city limits pay for library privileges through real estate and personal property taxes. So, there is no charge to sign-up. Because folks living outside the city limits do not pay these taxes, they pay the library directly for the same privileges. The cost is \$25.00 for a six month membership or \$50.00 for an annual membership.

We also want to stress that anyone is allowed to use the library. The only reason you need a library card is to check out items. Even if you do not have a card, you are more than welcome to visit the library; find a place to read a book off the shelves; participate in programs; and so much more! There is also a paperback trade program where you can bring in pocket-sized paperbacks and exchange them for select pocket-sized paperbacks in our sale room. There is also always a 50¢ book sale. Discarded magazines are available and are free to take.

REVIEW

MAY BOOK REVIEW BY KAREN GOATKEEPER

Graduation time is fast approaching. Many students will go on to another higher grade. Some will be leaving school behind. What will they do?
I've been reading books about where some of these graduates have gone. I wonder if any of the present graduates would have the nerve to do what these people did.
In "I Wonder As I Wander", Langston Hughes recounts his trip around the world. He had left home as a graduate to make his living as a writer, although most of the money he made was sent home to support his family.

Hughes had a chance to work on a movie in Moscow. He went. The movie was cancelled. He asked for permission and wrote about various parts of the USSR as he traveled to places far off the beaten path. When he left the USSR, he continued on through China and Japan to go around the world.

This trip was done with virtually no money as he sent most of his earnings to his mother and brother.

"Tisha: The Story of a Young Teacher in the Alaska Wilderness" by Robert Specht relates the story of a 19-year-old woman who goes to Alaska in the 1920s to teach at a small, very rural school. Her trip to Chicken is enough to send me packing for home.
"Across Five Aprils" by Irene Hunt covers the time from April, 1861, to April, 1865, as Jerod tries to survive on his family's Illinois farm. His father has a heart attack leaving him in charge at the age of ten. This is before tractors, phones, electricity.
My grandfather too was left in charge of a farm at the age of 13. He had to drop out of school to take over the plowing, maintenance and harvesting.
I wonder how many of this year's graduates would survive as these people did, alone.
How would they fare without family, smart phones, electricity, all the things we take for

granted?
