

It's that time of year again! Time for our annual Book-O-Lantern Competition!

The Salem Public Library is hosting a Book-O-Lantern Competition! Decorate a pumpkin to represent a story you enjoy or to look like your favorite book character. Anyone can participate, all you need is your creativity and a pumpkin (artificial pumpkins are allowed as well, but to keep things fair please do not carve or pierce through them)! No library card is required. Use paint, markers, glue, fabric, etc., but no carving or piercing please! Bring your creation to the library between October 8th and 19th.

Winners will be chosen from 3 categories:

5-11 years old 12-18 years old 19 years old & up

Voting will occur from October 21st through the 29th. Votes may be placed at the display at the library or by "liking" the pumpkin's photo on the library's Facebook page. The winning pumpkin in each age group will be determined by the combined total of votes made in the library and "likes" on Facebook. Prizes of candy or a book will be awarded (winner's choice). Pumpkins will need to be picked up between October 30th and November 2nd. If your pumpkin begins to decay before then, you will be asked to pick it up or library staff may dispose of it.

LIBRARY CARDS

Many Patrons will agree that their library card is one of the most important in their wallet. Getting a card is easy. Simply present a photo I.D. and proof of address. People living within the Salem city limits pay for library privileges through real estate and personal property taxes. So, there is no charge to signup. Because folks living outside the city limits do not pay these taxes, they pay the library directly for the same privileges. The cost is \$25.00 for a six month membership or \$50.00 for an annual membership.

We also want to stress that anyone is allowed to use the library. The only reason you need a library card is to check out items. Even if you do not have a card, you are more than welcome to visit the library; find a place to read a book off the shelves; participate in programs; and so much more! There is also a paperback trade program where you can bring in pocket-sized paperbacks and exchange them for select pocket-sized paperbacks in our sale room. There is also always a 50¢ book sale. Discarded magazines are available and are free to take.

MISSOURI EVERGREEN



Salem Public Library is part of the Missouri Evergreen consortium. This means that we share resources with over 50 other libraries throughout the state. So, if there is something that you wish to read,

watch, or listen to that is not part of Salem's collection, odds are that it can be borrowed from one of these other libraries. A request, or hold, may be placed for that item. It is then delivered to Salem Public Library via courier at no cost to you. You may be called, texted, or emailed when the item is available for circulation.



The Libby app is the easiest way to get started with digital books, audiobooks, and magazines from your public library!

- Install the Libby app from the app store on your Android or IOS (iPhone/iPad/iPod touch) device. Or, visit libbyapp.com in your Chrome, Firefox, Safari, or Edge browser.
- In Libby, follow the prompts to find your library and sign in with a valid card number.
- Browse your library's collection and borrow a title.
- Borrowed titles appear on your *Shelf* and download to the app automatically when you're on WI-FI, so you can read them when you're offline.
 - Tap Read With... to choose whether you'd like to open a book in Kindle or Libby.
 - Tap Open In Libby, Open Magazine, or Open Audiobook to start reading or listening in the app.
 - Tap Manage Loan to see options like Renew and Return.

EXCITING NEWS

Salem Public Library has been awarded a grant of \$11,490.00! We're calling this project Tech Revival because it will allow us to further upgrade library technology, improving services to our community. Through the grant, eleven new computers and eleven new monitors, as well as two new barcode scanners, fifteen licenses of Microsoft Office software, and three licenses of Deep Freeze software will be purchased.


Seven of the computers and monitors will replace outdated equipment in the public-use computer area. Three of the computers and monitors will replace failing equipment at the library catalog stations. One computer and monitor along with one barcode scanner will be upgrades at the circulation desk. The second barcode scanner will replace one that no longer functions in the cataloger's office.

Additionally, Friends of the Salem Public Library has generously provided local funds, making it possible to purchase a new circulation desk receipt printer as well hire local IT services for installation during Tech Revival.

Stay tuned for Tech Revival updates as the new equipment is installed and ready for use!

REVIEW

OCTOBER BOOK REVIEW

October is Pumpkin Month. These traditionally orange fruits have lots of uses besides being Halloween decorations. Thomas Jefferson and others of that time grew them as animal winter feed. Around the world pumpkins are used as vegetables in stews and more.

In the U.S. pumpkins usually become desserts.

There are lots of books about pumpkins, many with Halloween themes. In the picture book world that includes "It's the Great Pumpkin, Charlie Brown", "How Big Could Your Pumpkin Grow?" and "Pumpkin Jack". "The Pumpkin Patch" is nonfiction following a farmer planting, growing, harvesting and selling pumpkins.

For older students there is a science activity book "The Pumpkin Project" filled with investigations, pencil puzzles, stories, trivia, projects and recipes for pumpkins. The recipes include pumpkin flower soup, pumpkin stew, roasted pumpkin seeds, pumpkin puree, pumpkin bread, pudding, cheesecake and pie. The investigations are written for middle grade students using easily obtainable materials. Some are easily adaptable for younger or older students.

There are a variety of adult books with pumpkins mentioned or part of the plots. I read "Eyes on the Prize" by Sunni Jeffers. This is one of the Grace Chapel Inn series with which I was unfamiliar. Three sisters run this Inn and each had a story line.

One of the lines revolved around a giant pumpkin. Having grown lots of pumpkins, never giants, corresponded with giant pumpkin growers in the U.S., Sweden and Australia as well as attending a few Weigh Offs (There is a Weigh Off in Republic near Springfield, MO, every October.), I enjoyed this line the most. It brought back many happy memories.

The book was fast, easy reading. I found all of the story endings predictable. The book is well written, but the predictability was disappointing.

For anyone wanting to try a new pumpkin recipe in honor of Pumpkin Month, "The Pumpkin Project" is on the library shelf. Pumpkin cookies are my favorite.
